I. Opening of the session

(Agenda item 1)

1. CMA 7, convened pursuant to Article 16, paragraph 6, of the Paris Agreement, was held at the Hangar Convention and Fair Centre of the Amazon in Belém, Brazil, from 10 to 22 November 2025.¹ André Aranha Corrêa do Lago (Brazil), President of CMA 7, opened the session.

II. Organizational matters

(Agenda item 2)

A. Adoption of the agenda

(Agenda sub-item 2(a))

2. At its resumed 1st meeting,² on 10 November, the CMA considered document [FCCC/PA/CMA/2025/1/Add.3](#), containing the supplementary provisional agenda. The President recalled the understanding reached among Parties with regard to the adoption of the agendas for the sessions of the governing bodies outlined at the resumed 1st meeting of COP 30, on 10 November.³

3. The President proposed that the supplementary provisional agenda for CMA 7 be amended to reflect this understanding, with sub-item 7(b) and items 18–22 deleted.

4. On the proposal by the President, the CMA adopted the agenda as follows:

B. Election of additional officers

(Agenda sub-item 2(b))

5. At the resumed 1st meeting of CMA 7, the President informed Parties that, as stated during the resumed 1st meeting of COP 30, Sara Gonzalez (Dominican Republic) had begun consultations on the election of officers to bodies under the Convention, the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement.

6. The President invited regional groups and constituencies to submit all outstanding nominations by 15 November 2025 and urged Parties to actively consider nominating women and men equally for elective posts in all bodies in order to achieve gender balance. On a proposal by the President, the CMA decided to postpone the election until the closing plenary of CMA 7.

7. At the resumed 6th meeting of CMA 7, on 22 November, the President informed Parties that, since all nominees to the Bureau of COP 30 were from Parties to the Paris Agreement, it would not be necessary to elect an additional member of the Bureau at the election taking place at the closing plenary of COP 30.⁶

8. On a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members of various bodies, as reflected in the annex.⁷

9. The President informed Parties that nominations for election of officers to bodies under the Paris Agreement were outstanding and urged regional groups and constituencies to continue consultations and submit the outstanding nominations to the secretariat as soon as possible and by 28 February 2026 at the latest. On a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed that, once the outstanding nominations had been received by the secretariat, the nominees would be deemed elected at CMA 7 in accordance with established practice.

C. Organization of work, including for the sessions of the subsidiary bodies

(Agenda sub-item 2(c))

1. Organization of work

10. At its resumed 1st meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to follow the organization of work agreed at the resumed 1st meeting of COP 30.⁸

11. The President noted that the subsidiary bodies would conclude their work by 15 November and that he looked forward to hearing the outcomes of their sessions.

12. The President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies may recommend draft decisions and conclusions for consideration and adoption by the CMA under the following items on matters already on their agendas:

13. The President also informed Parties that, following the closure of the sessions of the subsidiary bodies, he would convene a plenary meeting to propose a way forward for the second week of the governing body sessions.

14. The CMA agreed to proceed on the basis of the organization of work outlined by the President.

15. The President recalled that the secretariat had prepared an updated synthesis report on NDCs.⁹ The President informed Parties that the synthesis report provides an overview of the

ambition and climate action outlined in Parties' NDCs and may be useful for Parties' deliberations at the Conference.

2. Opening statements

16. The joint 2nd meeting of CMA 7, COP 30 and CMP 20 and 2nd meeting of SBSTA 63 and SBI 63, on 11 November, were convened to hear opening statements from representatives of Parties, groups of Parties and observer organizations.¹⁰

3. Term, composition and terms of reference of the Consultative Group of Experts

17. At the 3rd meeting of CMA 7, on 15 November, the President recalled that the SBI had forwarded the outcome of its work on the term, composition and terms of reference of the Consultative Group of Experts to the COP for further consideration.¹¹

18. The President requested Hans Kolshus (Norway) and Tian Wang (China) to continue as the co-facilitators for this matter.

19. At its resumed 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [16/CMA.7](#), entitled "Term, composition and terms of reference of the Consultative Group of Experts".

4. Outcomes of work undertaken by the Presidency

20. At the 6th meeting, on 22 November, the President reported on the outcomes of the consultations undertaken with regard to the adoption of the agendas for the sessions of the governing bodies.¹²

(a) Global *mutirão*

21. At the 6th meeting, the President informed Parties that consultations had been undertaken on his behalf by senior members of his delegation, under the COP, the CMP and the CMA, on issues relating to:

- (a) Implementation of Article 9, paragraph 1, of the Paris Agreement;
- (b) Promoting international cooperation and addressing the concerns with climate change related trade-restrictive unilateral measures;
- (c) Responding to the synthesis report on NDCs and addressing the 1.5 °C ambition and implementation gap;
- (d) Reporting and review pursuant to Article 13 of the Paris Agreement: synthesis of biennial transparency reports.

22. On a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [1/CMA.7](#), entitled "Global Mutirão: Uniting humanity in a global mobilization against climate change".

23. A statement was made by a representative of one Party.¹³

(b) Special needs and special circumstances of Africa¹⁴

24. The President informed Parties that consultations on this matter had been undertaken by Pedro Brancante (Brazil). As part of the understanding reached among Parties referred to in paragraph 2 above, the President had proposed, and the Parties agreed, to organize a special event on this matter. The special event took place in Belém on 19 November and was well attended. The President also proposed, and the Parties agreed, that a summit under the action

agenda on the special needs and special circumstances of Africa would be convened in Africa in 2027.

25. At the resumed 6th meeting, the President noted that, despite constructive discussions on the matter, Parties could not reach consensus on a way forward.

(c) Belém Political Package¹⁵

26. At the resumed 6th meeting, the President proposed that the following decisions adopted under the CMA be part of the Belém Political Package:

- (a) Decision [1/CMA.7](#), entitled “Global Mutirão: Uniting humanity in a global mobilization against climate change”;
- (b) Decision [2/CMA.7](#), entitled “United Arab Emirates just transition work programme”;
- (c) Decision [3/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to the global stocktake”;
- (d) Decision [5/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance”;¹⁶

27. At the same meeting, the President informed Parties that he would create two road maps: one on halting and reversing deforestation and another on transitioning away from fossil fuels in a just, orderly and equitable manner that would be informed by science and would be inclusive.²¹

28. He also informed Parties that, in the spirit of *mutirão*, he would convene high-level dialogues to gather key international organizations, governments of both producing and consuming countries, industry, workers, scholars and civil society and would report to the CMA.

29. At the same meeting, the President recognized that the procedural challenges that occurred at the meeting must be avoided in the future and requested the secretariat to prepare best practices for guiding the UNFCCC process in a way that ensures transparency, inclusivity, predictability and legitimacy.^{22, 23}

D. Approval of the report on credentials

(Agenda sub-item 2(d))

30. At the 6th meeting, the President referred to the report on credentials,²⁴ submitted by the Bureau in accordance with rule 20 of the draft rules of procedure being applied.

31. On the basis of the report, the CMA approved the credentials of Parties attending the session. The CMA also approved the credentials of the following Parties that were received after the submission of the report: Cook Islands, Ethiopia, Japan, Kenya, North Macedonia, Tonga and Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of). In addition, the secretariat received credentials from the Lao People's Democratic Republic on 13 January 2026.

E. Attendance

32. Information on participation in the sessions in Belém is available in document [FCCC/CP/2025/INF.1](#).

33. According to decision [2/CMA.1](#), the admission of organizations as observers as decided by the COP also applies to the CMA.²⁵

F. Documentation

34. The documents that were before CMA 7 are available on the UNFCCC website.²⁶

III. Reports of the subsidiary bodies

(Agenda item 3)

A. Report of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice

(Agenda sub-item 3(a))

35. At the 3rd meeting of CMA 7, the SBSTA Chair, Adonia Ayebare (Uganda), introduced the draft report on SBSTA 63²⁷ and gave an oral report on the results of SBSTA 62 and 63.²⁸

36. On a proposal by the President, the CMA took note of the report on SBSTA 62,²⁹ the draft report on SBSTA 63 and the oral report by the SBSTA Chair. The President expressed

his deep appreciation to the SBSTA Chair for his leadership in guiding the work of the SBSTA and for supporting the Presidency in ensuring the effective management of work under the subsidiary bodies and its smooth transition to the governing bodies.

37. The President noted that recommendations of the SBSTA would be addressed under the relevant CMA agenda items.

B. Report of the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (Agenda sub-item 3(b))

38. At the resumed 1st meeting of CMA 7, on a recommendation of SBI 62,³⁰ the CMA adopted decision [4/CMA.7](#), entitled “Guidance relating to adaptation communications”.

39. At the 3rd meeting of the CMA, the SBI Chair, Julia Gardiner (Australia), introduced the draft report on SBI 63³¹ and gave an oral report on the results of SBI 62 and 63.³²

40. On a proposal by the President, the CMA took note of the report on SBI 62,³³ the draft report on SBI 63 and the oral report by the SBI Chair. The President expressed his deep appreciation to the SBI Chair for her leadership in guiding the work of the SBI and for supporting the Presidency in ensuring the effective management of work under the subsidiary bodies and its smooth transition to the governing bodies.

41. On a recommendation of the SBI,³⁴ the CMA adopted decision [27/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to Action for Climate Empowerment”.

42. The President noted that other recommendations of the SBI would be addressed under the relevant CMA agenda items.

IV. Matters relating to the global stocktake (Agenda item 4)

A. Procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process (Agenda sub-item 4(a))

43. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.³⁵

44. At the 3rd meeting, the President recalled that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.³⁶ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

45. The President requested Kelsey Gray (Australia) and Eduardo Silva Besa (Chile) to continue as the co-facilitators for this matter. In addition, the President invited Mukhtar Babayev (Azerbaijan) and Andreas Bjelland Eriksen (Norway) to conduct ministerial consultations thereon.³⁷

46. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [3/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to the global stocktake”.

B. Reports for 2024 and 2025 on the annual global stocktake dialogue referred to in paragraph 187 of decision 1/CMA.5

(Agenda sub-item 4(b))

(Agenda item 5)

50. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁴⁰

51. At the 3rd meeting, the President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.⁴¹ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

52. The President requested Federica Fricano (Italy) and Joseph Teo (Singapore) to continue as the co-chairs for this matter. In addition, the President invited Alicia Bárcena (Mexico) and Krzysztof Bolesta (Poland) to conduct ministerial consultations thereon.

53. At the 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [2/CMA.7](#), entitled “United Arab Emirates just transition work programme”.

54. A statement was made by a representative of one Party.⁴²

VI. Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme

(Agenda item 6)

55. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁴³

56. At the 3rd meeting, the President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for consideration.⁴⁴ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

57. The President requested Ursula Fuentes Hutfilter (Germany) and Maesela John Kekana (South Africa) to continue as the co-facilitators for this matter. In addition, the President invited Sara Agesen (Spain) and Wael Aboulmagd (Egypt) to conduct ministerial consultations thereon.

58. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [13/CMA.7](#), entitled “Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme”.

59. Statements were made by representatives of five Parties.^{45, 46}

60. Colombia and Panama stated their objection to decision [13/CMA.7](#) and expressed concerns about the process followed for adopting the decision.⁴⁷

61. At the resumed 6th meeting, statements were made by representatives of three Parties.⁴⁸

62. The President noted that decision [13/CMA.7](#) as adopted allows for further work. The CMA requested the subsidiary bodies to conduct such work at SB 64 (June 2026) on the basis of the work undertaken at CMA 7. Statements were made by representatives of five Parties, including four on behalf of groups of Parties.⁴⁹

VII. Reporting and review pursuant to Article 13 of the Paris Agreement: provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building

(Agenda item 7)

63. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBI.⁵⁰

64. At the 3rd meeting, the President informed Parties that the SBI had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.⁵¹ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

65. The President invited Sandra Motshwanedi (South Africa) and Ole-Kenneth Nielsen (Denmark) to continue as the co-facilitators for this matter.

66. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [15/CMA.7](#), entitled “Provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building”.

67. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁵²

68. At the 3rd meeting, the President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.⁵³ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

69. The President requested Xiang Gao (China) and Tina Kobilšek (Slovenia) to continue as the co-facilitators for this matter. In addition, the President invited Jochen Flasbarth (Germany) and Rohey John Manjang (Gambia) to conduct ministerial consultations thereon.

70. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [12/CMA.7](#), entitled “Global goal on adaptation”.

71. Statements were then made by representatives of seven Parties, including two on behalf of groups of Parties.^{54, 55}

72. Panama expressed objection to decision [12/CMA.7](#), and Uruguay, on behalf of Argentina, Ecuador and Paraguay, stated that it does not support the decision and expressed disappointment with the process followed for its adoption.⁵⁶ Colombia, on behalf of AILAC, expressed concerns regarding both the content of decision [12/CMA.7](#) and the process followed for its adoption. Switzerland raised legal and process concerns related to the text of the decision. The European Union expressed concerns about accepting the text in the form presented.

73. At the resumed 6th meeting, statements were made by representatives of three Parties.⁵⁷

74. At the same meeting, the President noted that decision [12/CMA.7](#) as adopted allows for further work. The CMA requested the subsidiary bodies to conduct such work at SB 64 on the basis of the work undertaken at CMA 7. Statements were made by representatives of five Parties, including four on behalf of groups of Parties.⁵⁸

B. Report of the Adaptation Committee (Agenda sub-item 8(b))

75. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁵⁹

76. On recommendations of the subsidiary bodies,⁶⁰ at its 3rd meeting the CMA welcomed the 2025 report of the Adaptation Committee.⁶¹

C. Review of the progress, effectiveness and performance of the Adaptation Committee

(Agenda sub-item 8(c))

77. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁶²

78. At the resumed 6th meeting, the President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies had agreed at their opening plenaries to defer consideration of this matter to SB 64.⁶³

IX. Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts

(Agenda item 9)

79. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁶⁴

80. On recommendations of SB 62,⁶⁵ the CMA considered the draft decision entitled “Joint annual report of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change for 2024”.

81. At the 3rd meeting, the President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded the matter of the review of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts to the relevant governing body or bodies for consideration.⁶⁶ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

82. The President requested Cornelia Jaeger (Austria) and Pepetua Latasi (Tuvalu) to continue as the co-facilitators for this matter.

83. At its resumed 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted:

(a) Decision [22/CMA.7](#), entitled “Review of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts”;

(b) Decision [23/CMA.7](#), entitled “Joint annual report of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change for 2025”;

(c) Decision [24/CMA.7](#), entitled “Joint annual report of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change for 2024”.

84. On a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members to the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism and the Advisory Board of the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change, as reflected in the annex.

X. Matters relating to finance

(Agenda item 10)

85. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider matters relating to finance. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established contact groups on these matters.

86. At the 3rd meeting, the President invited Ed Miliband (United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland) and Deborah Mlongo Barasa (Kenya) to undertake ministerial consultations on matters relating to finance, focusing on the compilation and synthesis of, and summary report on the in-session workshop on, biennial communications of information related to Article 9, paragraph 5, of the Paris Agreement; the Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue on the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement; and adaptation finance.

A. Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance

(Agenda sub-item 10(a))

87. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President thanked the Co-Chairs of the SCF, Diann Black-Layne (Antigua and Barbuda) and Apollonia Miola (European Union), for their leadership of the SCF, and the members of the SCF for their work.

88. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter co-chaired by Hendrikje Reich (Germany) and Debra-Lee Swanepoel (South Africa). The CMA noted that the second review of the functions of the SCF was on the agenda of the SBI and that the CMA would take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendation of the SBI on that matter.⁶⁷

89. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [5/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance”.

90. The President informed Parties that the SBI had deferred consideration of the second review of the functions of the SCF to SBI 64 (June 2026).⁶⁸

B. Guidance to the Green Climate Fund

91. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President thanked the Co-Chairs of the Board of the Green Climate Fund, Leif Holmberg (Sweden) and Seyni Nafo (Mali), for their leadership of the Board, and the members of the Board for their work.

92. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter co-chaired by David Kaluba (Zambia) and Simon Stumpf (Germany).

93. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [6/CMA.7](#), entitled “Guidance to the Green Climate Fund”.

C. Guidance to the Global Environment Facility

(Agenda sub-item 10(c))

94. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President thanked the Chair of the Global Environment Facility, Carlos Manuel Rodríguez (Costa Rica), for his leadership, and the members and the Global Environment Facility secretariat for the work undertaken.

95. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter co-chaired by David Kaluba and Simon Stumpf.

99. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter co-chaired by Jose Gabriel Delgado Jimenez (Austria) and Daniel Lund (Fiji).

100. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [8/CMA.7](#), entitled “Report of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage and guidance to the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage”.

E. Matters relating to the Adaptation Fund

(Agenda sub-item 10(e))

101. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBI as it relates to the membership of the Adaptation Fund Board, arrangements for the Adaptation Fund to exclusively serve the Paris Agreement and the initiation of the fifth review of the Adaptation Fund.⁷⁰

102. The President thanked the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Adaptation Fund Board, Antonio Navarra (Italy) and Washington Zhakata (Zimbabwe) respectively, for their leadership of the Board, and the members and alternate members of the Board for their work.

103. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter co-chaired by Koosje Beumer-van der Loo (Kingdom of the Netherlands) and Isatou F. Camara (Gambia).

104. At the 3rd meeting, the President recalled that the SBI had forwarded the outcome of its work to the CMA for further consideration⁷¹ and he informed Parties that the consideration would take place under the contact group referred to in paragraph 103 above.

105. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [9/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to the Adaptation Fund”.

106. Further, on a proposal by the President, the CMA requested the SBI to continue consideration of matters relating to the membership of the Adaptation Fund Board, arrangements for the Adaptation Fund to exclusively serve the Paris Agreement and the initiation of the fifth review of the Adaptation Fund at SBI 64 on the basis of the work undertaken at SBI 63.⁷² The CMA noted that this work does not represent agreement among Parties, prejudice further work or prevent Parties from expressing their views in the future, or prejudice the number of draft decisions on these matters that Parties may wish to recommend or consider.

131. At its 3rd meeting, on a recommendation of the SBI,⁸⁷ the CMA adopted decision [25/CMA.7](#), entitled “Annual technical progress report of the Paris Committee on Capacity-building for 2025”.

XIII. Matters relating to the least developed countries

(Agenda item 13)

132. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBI.⁸⁸

133. At its 3rd meeting, on a recommendation of the SBI,⁸⁹ the CMA adopted decision [26/CMA.7](#), entitled “Matters relating to the least developed countries”.

XIV. Report of the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures

(Agenda item 14)

134. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁹⁰

135. At the 3rd meeting, the President informed Parties that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further guidance.⁹¹ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

136. The President requested Veronika Bagi (Hungary) and Diann Black-Layne to co-facilitate discussions thereon.

137. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [14/CMA.7](#), entitled “Report of the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures”.

XV. Matters relating to Article 6 of the Paris Agreement

(Agenda item 15)

A. Implementation of the guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement

(Agenda sub-item 15(a))

138. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President invited Pacifica F. Achieng Ogola (Kenya) and Peer Stiansen (Norway) to co-facilitate discussions on this matter.

139. At its resumed 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [19/CMA.7](#), entitled “Implementation of the guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement”.

B. Report of the Supervisory Body and guidance for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement

(Agenda sub-item 15(b))

140. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President thanked the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Supervisory Body for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement, Martin Hession (Ireland) and Maria AlJishi (Saudi Arabia) respectively, for their leadership in guiding the work of the Supervisory Body, and the members and alternate members of the Body for their work.

141. The President invited Kate Hancock (Australia) and Sonam Tashi (Bhutan) to co-facilitate discussions on this matter.

142. At its resumed 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [20/CMA.7](#), entitled “Further guidance for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement”.

143. Further, on a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members to the Supervisory Body, as reflected in the annex.

C. Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision 4/CMA.3

(Agenda sub-item 15(c))

144. At its resumed 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBSTA.⁹²

145. The President invited El Hadji Mbaye Diagne (Senegal) and Jacqueline Ruesga (New Zealand) to co-facilitate discussions on this matter.

146. At its resumed 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [21/CMA.7](#), entitled “Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision [4/CMA.3](#)”.

XVI. Matters relating to the committee to facilitate implementation and promote compliance referred to in Article 15, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement

(Agenda item 16)

147. At the resumed 1st meeting, the President thanked the Co-Chairs of the Paris Agreement Implementation and Compliance Committee, Eyad AlJubran (Saudi Arabia) and Jacob Werksman (European Union), for their leadership in guiding the work of the Committee, and the members and alternate members of the Committee for their work.

148. The CMA took note of the annual report of the Committee for 2025,⁹³ including the measures taken by the secretariat to address the concerns raised by the Committee in its previous annual report⁹⁴ with regard to the NDC registry.

149. With the concerns raised in the 2024 report addressed, the CMA concluded its consideration of the 2024 report.

150. At its 6th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members to the Committee, as reflected in the annex.

XVII. Administrative, financial and institutional matters

(Agenda item 17)

151. At its resumed 1st meeting, on the proposal by the President, the CMA endorsed decision [20/CP.30](#), entitled “Administrative, financial and institutional matters”.⁹⁵

152. At its 3rd meeting, on the proposal by the President, the CMA endorsed decision [19/CP.30](#), entitled “Administrative, financial and institutional matters”.⁹⁶

XVIII. High-level segment

(Agenda item 18)

153. At the joint 4th meeting of CMA 7, COP 30 and CMP 20, on 17 November, the President opened the high-level segment, which continued at the joint 5th meeting of CMA 7, COP 30 and CMP 20, on 18 November.⁹⁷

XIX. Other matters

(Agenda item 19)

154. At its resumed 6th meeting, the CMA noted that no other matters had been raised under this agenda item.

XX. Conclusion of the session

(Agenda item 20)

155. At its resumed 6th meeting, the CMA considered the draft report on the session⁹⁸ and, on a proposal by the President, authorized the Rapporteur to complete the report under the guidance of the President and with the assistance of the secretariat.

156. The UNFCCC Deputy Executive Secretary informed Parties that additional activities mandated at this session have financial and human resource implications beyond the

provisions included in the budget for the biennium 2026–2027,⁹⁹ noting that funding estimates and categorization of activities are preliminary and based on the information available at the time.¹⁰⁰ Unless otherwise specified, all activities are categorized as temporary or short term.¹⁰¹

157. The Deputy Executive Secretary noted that the secretariat is counting on Parties to provide funding for the requested activities in a timely and predictable manner, as without such contributions the secretariat will not be in a position to undertake them.

158. On a proposal by Türkiye, the CMA adopted resolution [1/CMA.7](#), entitled “Expression of gratitude to the Government of the Federative Republic of Brazil and the people of the city of Belém”.

159. At the joint 7th meeting of CMA 7, COP 30 and CMP 20, on 22 November, representatives of Parties, groups of Parties and observer organizations made closing statements.¹⁰²

160. The President then declared the session closed.
