1. The list of participants attending the thirtieth session of the Conference of the Parties, the twentieth session of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol, the seventh session of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement and the sixty-third sessions of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation has been prepared on the basis of information received by the secretariat as at 21 November 2025.
2. The list of participants has been generated from the UNFCCC Online Registration System with input entered directly into the system by national focal points and designated contact points.

I. On-site participation

3. The names of participants issued a physical badge valid for at least one day of the sessional period (10–21 November 2025) are listed in an Excel file on the UNFCCC website.¹
4. The Excel file on the UNFCCC website contains 13 worksheets; the corresponding statistics are presented in table 1. For participants with multiple nominations from different nominators, the Excel file includes information only from the last used badge, namely the last active badge. If a participant had no active badge, information from the last printed badge was used. Participants with printed badges whose registration was later changed to virtual-only participation but did not log on to the virtual platform are included on the on-site participants list.
