## **Activities mandated by the governing and subsidiary bodies at the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Belém and their respective cost implications**

### **Note by the secretariat**

#### *Summary*

This note provides an overview of the additional activities mandated by the governing and subsidiary bodies at the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Belém. It focuses on the associated administrative and institutional cost implications, as well as resource requirements beyond those already budgeted for specified years. The objective is to ensure transparency regarding future budgetary needs and to support informed decision-making by Parties.

## **I. Introduction**

### **A. Mandate**

1. COP 29 requested the secretariat to prepare an information document after each session of the COP that presents additional activities mandated at that session and their respective cost implications for the information of Parties.<sup>1</sup>

### **B. Scope**

2. This note presents additional activities mandated by the governing and subsidiary bodies at the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Belém and their respective estimated cost implications. The document reflects only those mandates for additional activities that give rise to resource requirements over and above those already budgeted for. As such, the cost figures presented herein represent additional budgetary requirements resulting from decisions adopted at the Belém Conference.

### **C. Approach to estimating the cost implications of mandated activities**

#### **1. Preparation of preliminary cost estimates during sessions**

3. During sessions, the secretariat provides Parties with an indication of the administrative and budgetary implications of emerging new mandates under consideration by the governing and subsidiary bodies, and decisions to be recommended by the subsidiary bodies for consideration and adoption by the governing bodies.<sup>2</sup>

4. Further, upon request by co-chairs of informal groups or co-facilitators of informal consultations, and when Parties seek clarification, the secretariat makes preliminary cost estimates for emerging new mandates available to support informed decision-making by Parties. In addition, the secretariat delivers oral statements outlining preliminary cost implications of new activities mandated in decisions and conclusions adopted at the sessions. These in-session cost indications are based on standard costing methodologies and the best available information at the time.

#### **2. Post-session review and assessment**

5. As a new step, the secretariat undertook a comprehensive post-session review and reassessment of decisions and conclusions adopted at the Belém Conference that have cost implications over and above what has been budgeted already. The post-session review included:

(a) Interpretation of mandates: each decision was reviewed to clarify the specific activities required for implementation. This included identifying the outputs explicitly mandated, assessing whether the scale or frequency of activities was specified and considering the degree of flexibility provided regarding modalities of delivery. Where decisions did not define detailed parameters (e.g. concerning the scope or number of workshops), the secretariat determined an implementation approach that reflects the intent of Parties while ensuring efficient and proportionate delivery;

(b) Assessment of staffing requirements: on the basis of the clarified scope, a careful review of human resource implications was undertaken in consultation with the responsible divisions. This review examined the extent to which the newly mandated activities could be absorbed within existing staff capacities; opportunities to reprioritize or reallocate tasks within current teams; the minimum additional staffing required, if any, to ensure effective implementation; and the most appropriate contractual modalities for any additional capacity needs;

(c) Assessment of non-staff costs: non-staff requirements were reviewed separately and in detail. This included travel, meeting services, contractual services and other operational expenditures. Where relevant, additional information was taken into account, such as instances in which meeting costs may be borne fully or partially by host Governments or partners.

6. The outcome of this process led to an adjustment of preliminary estimates to reflect more accurate and, where possible, reduced cost assumptions of the additional resources required to implement the new activities mandated in decisions adopted in Belém. These figures therefore differ, in some cases, from the indicative in-session estimates, as they reflect a more detailed examination of scope, staffing modalities and delivery costs.

## **II. Additional mandated activities and their respective cost implications**

### **A. Decisions of the governing bodies**

#### **1. Decisions 6/CP.30, 2/CMP.20 and 14/CMA.7: Report of the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures**

7. In decisions [6/CP.30](#), [2/CMP.20](#) and [14/CMA.7](#), the secretariat was requested to deliver annual two-day global dialogues on the impacts of the implementation of response measures in 2026–2029 and a summary report on each.

8. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 331,000 per year for 2026–2027 and 2028–2029.

#### **2. Decisions 10/CP.30 and 17/CMA.7: Review of the functions of the Climate Technology Centre**

9. The COP, in paragraph 5 of decision [10/CP.30](#), requested the secretariat to prepare an informal consolidated version of the amended CTCN terms of reference and make it available on the UNFCCC website.

10. The COP, in paragraph 8 of decision [10/CP.30](#), requested the secretariat to:

(a) Prepare and issue a call for proposals to host the Climate Technology Centre secretariat;

(b) Respond to enquiries from interested organizations, in consultation with the evaluation panel referred to in paragraph 10(c) below, as appropriate;

(c) Convene an evaluation panel;

(d) Make the executive summaries of the submitted proposals available on the UNFCCC website;

(e) Support the evaluation panel in preparing an evaluation report.

11. The COP, in paragraph 13 of decision [10/CP.30](#), and the CMA, in paragraph 9 of decision [17/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to develop a draft memorandum of understanding with the host to be recommended at SBI 64.

12. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 50,000 for 2026.

#### **3. Decisions 11/CP.30 and 22/CMA.7: Review of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts**

13. The CMA, in paragraphs 17, 29, 30, 33 and 34 of decision [22/CMA.7](#), as endorsed by the COP in decision [11/CP.30](#), requested the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts to:

(a) Update, by its 25<sup>th</sup> meeting, the terms of reference, including with regard to membership, and plan of action of the expert group on action and support in the light of the

evolving loss and damage landscape, noting the cross-cutting nature of action and support and ensuring that action and support are systematically considered in the work of the other expert groups, the technical expert group and the task force of the Executive Committee in order to promote synergy and consistency in their work;

(b) Facilitate the work of its expert groups, technical expert group and task force and enhance efforts to engage relevant experts in undertaking activities under their respective plans of action;

(c) Enhance its work on non-economic losses, including through its expert group on non-economic losses and implementation of the second plan of action thereof, with a view to assisting developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change in seeking technical assistance under the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change;

(d) Develop knowledge products focused on enhancing understanding of approaches to managing compound risks and impacts associated with climate change and responding to loss and damage arising from cascading impacts associated with the adverse effects of climate change;

(e) Develop knowledge products on existing methodologies and approaches for assessing economic and non-economic loss and damage for the purpose of informing the development of context-specific national methodologies and approaches for responding to loss and damage at the national level and supporting developing countries in preparing technical assistance and funding requests;

(f) Develop knowledge products on how Parties could, as appropriate, develop, and integrate consideration of loss and damage into, national response plans;

(g) Improve the user-friendliness, relevance and dissemination of its technical products to practitioners working, including at the local level, on averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage in developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change;

(h) Enhance the meaningful involvement of Indigenous Peoples, local communities and local governments, women, youth and children, and displaced populations in the development and dissemination of knowledge products;

(i) Develop communication and outreach activities jointly with the Advisory Board of the Santiago network, including by leveraging the Santiago network's capacity to reach out to stakeholders outside the UNFCCC process;

(j) Develop 'explainers' that include key messages on the mandate for and work under the Warsaw International Mechanism, including on its institutional arrangements, to use them as communication tools and update them, as needed;

(k) Undertake with the Advisory Board of the Santiago network joint outreach to UNFCCC national focal points, loss and damage contact points, national liaisons to the Santiago network, and national authorities or national focal points for the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage to promote synergies in their work;

(l) Disseminate information on knowledge products and activities arising from the work of the Executive Committee and under the Santiago network through the loss and damage contact points and liaisons.

14. Pursuant to this decision, the secretariat will support the Executive Committee in undertaking these tasks. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 451,000 per year for 2026–2027.

#### **4. Decisions 17/CP.30 and 27/CMA.7: Matters relating to Action for Climate Empowerment**

15. The COP, in paragraph 5 of decision [17/CP.30](#), and the CMA, in paragraph 5 of decision 27/CMA.7, requested the SBI to organize an interactive technical workshop, to be held at the 2026 Dialogue on Action for Climate Empowerment, for a broad range of

participants, including representatives of Parties, UNFCCC constituted bodies and work programmes, and other stakeholders, as well as experts and practitioners, to discuss potential elements for a new action plan under the Glasgow work programme on Action for Climate Empowerment.

16. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 26,000 for 2026.

#### **5. Decision 7/CP.30: Belém gender action plan**

17. The COP, in paragraph 6 of decision [7/CP.30](#), adopted the Belém gender action plan for 2026–2034 contained in the annex to decision [7/CP.30](#). The COP requested the secretariat to lead the delivery of outputs set out in tables 1–5 of the annex to decision [7/CP.30](#).

18. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 121,000 for 2026 and EUR 151,000 for 2027.

#### **6. Decision 8/CP.30: National adaptation plans**

19. The COP, in paragraph 12 of decision [8/CP.30](#), requested the LEG to compile from relevant reports, in collaboration with the Adaptation Committee and the Standing Committee on Finance, an overview of climate finance flows and financial support provided by developed country Parties to developing country Parties for formulating and implementing NAPs for inclusion in the 2026 NAP progress report.

20. The COP, in paragraph 19 of decision [8/CP.30](#), requested the LEG to prepare, in collaboration with the Adaptation Committee, a technical paper on how the least developed countries and small island developing States are integrating different adaptation approaches into their NAPs.

21. Pursuant to this decision, the secretariat will support the LEG in undertaking these tasks. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 28,000 for 2026.

#### **7. Decision 15/CP.30: Matters relating to the least developed countries**

22. The COP, in paragraph 14 of decision [15/CP.30](#), requested the LEG to hold a meeting during NAP Expo 2026 to facilitate an exchange of views among relevant organizations and other stakeholders on enhancing the provision of support to the least developed countries for implementing NAPs, and to include a summary of those views in its report to SBI 65.

23. The COP, in paragraph 18 of decision [15/CP.30](#), requested the secretariat to prepare a synthesis report on the progress of the work of the LEG for consideration at SBI 64 while continuing to support implementation of the LEG work programme.

24. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 238,000 for 2026.

#### **8. Decision 16/CP.30: Enhanced engagement of local communities in the Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform**

25. The COP, in paragraph 1 of decision [16/CP.30](#), noted with appreciation the two dialogues and thematic workshop convened by the Presidency of COP 30 on ways to further engage local communities in the UNFCCC process, as mandated by paragraph 15 of decision [14/CP.29](#), and requested the secretariat to prepare an informal report thereon, which will serve as an input to the 2027 review of the Facilitative Working Group of the Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform,<sup>3</sup> as appropriate.

26. In paragraph 2 of the same decision the COP also requested the secretariat to hold an in-session workshop in line with paragraph 15 of decision [14/CP.29](#) at SBSTA 64 and to prepare an informal report thereon, which will serve as an input to the review referred to in paragraph 25 above.

27. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 102,000 in 2026.

**9. Decision 20/CP.30: Administrative, financial and institutional matters**

28. The COP, in paragraph 34 of decision [20/CP.30](#), requested the secretariat to deploy a version of the UNFCCC website in Arabic, in line with the principle of equal treatment of the six official languages of the United Nations.

29. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 355,000 per year for 2026–2027. The mandate is open-ended and therefore has budgetary implications beyond 2027.

**10. Decision 1/CMA.7: Global Mutirão: uniting humanity in a global mobilization against climate change**

30. The CMA, in paragraph 38 of decision [1/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to conduct peer exchange workshops, including at climate weeks, to facilitate the sharing of knowledge and good practices in relation to the preparation and implementation of nationally determined contributions, drawing on the reports on the annual dialogue on how the outcomes of the global stocktake are informing the preparation of nationally determined contributions.

31. The CMA, in paragraph 52 of decision [1/CMA.7](#), decided to convene a high-level ministerial round table to reflect on the implementation of the new collective quantified goal on climate finance, including on the quantitative and qualitative elements related to the provision of finance.

32. The CMA, in paragraphs 54–55 of decision [1/CMA.7](#), decided to establish a two-year work programme on climate finance, including on Article 9, paragraph 1, of the Paris Agreement in the context of Article 9 of the Paris Agreement as a whole, to be co-facilitated by co-chairs, one from a developed country and one from a developing country.

33. The CMA, in paragraph 57 of decision [1/CMA.7](#), requested the subsidiary bodies to hold a dialogue at SB 64, 66 and 68, with the participation of Parties and other stakeholders, including the International Trade Centre, the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development and the World Trade Organization, to consider opportunities, challenges and barriers in relation to enhancing international cooperation related to the role of trade; decided to exchange experience and views on related matters at a high-level event in 2028; and requested the subsidiary bodies to present a report summarizing the discussions at the high-level event.

34. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 626,000 per year for 2026–2027.

**11. Decision 2/CMA.7: United Arab Emirates just transition work programme**

35. The CMA, in paragraph 24 of decision [2/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to map relevant instruments, initiatives and processes under the Convention and the Paris Agreement and relevant entities in the United Nations system to support the implementation of the United Arab Emirates just transition work programme and as input to the review referred to in paragraph 3 of decision [3/CMA.5](#); and to prepare a synthesis report thereon.

36. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 323,000 for 2026.

**12. Decision 3/CMA.7: Matters related to the global stocktake**

37. Regarding the United Arab Emirates dialogue on implementing the global stocktake outcomes, the CMA, in paragraph 5 of decision [3/CMA.7](#), decided that the dialogue will be held in conjunction with SB 64 and 66, after which it will conclude. The CMA, in paragraph 7 of decision [3/CMA.7](#), requested the co-facilitators of the dialogue to prepare, in a timely manner, with the support of the secretariat, a factual and non-prescriptive summary report on each dialogue on the basis of the inputs provided and discussions held at the dialogues. The CMA, in paragraph 8 of decision [3/CMA.7](#), decided to convene, as part of the dialogue, a high-level ministerial round table at CMA 9.

38. Regarding the procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process, the CMA, in paragraph 17 of decision [3/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to further improve the online availability of all inputs to the global stocktake.

39. The CMA, in paragraph 21 of decision [3/CMA.7](#), requested the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies to ensure sufficient time for each component of the global stocktake, particularly the consideration of outputs component, while taking into account lessons learned from the first global stocktake, as well as the constraints faced by Parties and other stakeholders with limited capacity, and noted that this time may include intersessional work, as appropriate.

40. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 90,000 per year for 2026–2027.

**13. Decision 4/CMA.7: Guidance relating to adaptation communications**

41. The CMA, in paragraph 3 of decision [4/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to make the supplementary guidance for voluntary use by Parties in communicating information in accordance with the possible elements of an adaptation communication, prepared by the Adaptation Committee, available in all official United Nations languages.

42. This activity involves translation, quality control and publication of existing guidance. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 15,000 for 2026.

**14. Decision 5/CMA.7: Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance**

43. The CMA, in paragraph 4 of decision [5/CMA.7](#), requested the Standing Committee on Finance to prepare a report on the doubling of adaptation finance in line with paragraph 18 of decision [1/CMA.3](#) for consideration at CMA 10 taking into account information in relevant UNFCCC reports and other relevant reports by other sources, as appropriate.

44. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 33,000 for 2027.

**15. Decision 11/CMA.7: Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue on the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement**

45. The CMA, in paragraphs 10–12 of decision [11/CMA.7](#), decided to hold deliberations under the Veredas Dialogue on the implementation of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement, building on the Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue on the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement and taking into account concerns and needs for safeguards, including:

(a) The need to pursue all three long-term goals of the Paris Agreement together, so that implementation of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), will facilitate the collective achievement of the goals articulated in Article 2, paragraph 1(a–b);

(b) That Article 2, paragraph 1(c), is complementary to and no substitute for the provision and mobilization of financial support for developing countries under Article 9;

(c) That efforts for making finance flows consistent with a pathway towards low greenhouse gas emissions and climate-resilient development are nationally determined, taking into account country-driven strategies and the bottom-up nature of the Paris Agreement, respecting national sovereignty and taking into account different national circumstances, time frames and approaches of Parties, in particular developing country Parties, especially those that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change;

(d) The need to ensure that collective efforts for and deliberations on implementing Article 2, paragraph 1(c), are undertaken in a facilitative, enabling, non-punitive and non-prescriptive manner;

(e) The need to ensure transparency and avoid creating an additional burden for Parties, including with regard to reporting and implementation.

46. The CMA, in paragraph 13 of decision [11/CMA.7](#), requested the Presidency of the CMA to convene the Xingu Finance Talks under the Veredas Dialogue, in consultation with the co-chairs thereof, as an annual high-level round table with a view to facilitating a cooperative exchange of views among all interested Parties and non-Party stakeholders, in

particular academia, international financial institutions and the private sector, on practical solutions that address the challenges and opportunities in the implementation of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), and its complementarity with Article 9.

47. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 158,000 per year for 2026–2027.

#### **16. Decision 12/CMA.7: Global goal on adaptation**

48. The CMA, in paragraphs 14, 15 and 24 of decision [12/CMA.7](#), requested the Adaptation Committee to provide technical guidance and analytical support to Parties for implementing the United Arab Emirates Framework for Global Climate Resilience, including support for reporting thereon and for integrating the Framework into NAPs and other national planning instruments, and to participate in the technical work to be undertaken by the subsidiary bodies on improving methodologies and metadata for the Belém Adaptation Indicators.

49. The CMA, in paragraph 16 of decision [12/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to prepare a technical paper, for consideration at the latest at CMA 8, on the targets outlined in paragraphs 9–10 of decision [2/CMA.5](#), and the Belém Adaptation Indicators, which will:

- (a) Consider the use of the Indicators;
- (b) Include a mapping of existing synthesis report processes on adaptation information relevant to the global goal on adaptation;
- (c) Identify synergies as well as gaps and potential ways to fill those gaps;
- (d) Analyse guidelines, tools and methodologies for aggregating the Belém Adaptation Indicators under the United Arab Emirates Framework for Global Climate Resilience.

50. The CMA, in paragraph 29 of decision [12/CMA.7](#), decided that, in the first phase of the Baku Adaptation Road Map, covering 2026–2028, two workshops per year shall be organized by the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies with the support of the secretariat, one to be held in session and one intersessionally, and the secretariat shall prepare a technical paper, aimed at enhancing adaptive capacity, strengthening cooperation and facilitating adaptation planning and implementation in line with different national circumstances and in the context of Article 2, paragraph 1(a), of the Paris Agreement.

51. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 500,000 per year for 2026–2027.

#### **17. Decision 13/CMA.7: Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme**

52. The CMA, in paragraph 5 of decision [13/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to organize, under the guidance of the co-chairs of the Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme, future global dialogues and investment-focused events under the work programme in such a manner as to:

- (a) Enhance inclusive, geographically balanced and effective engagement of participants, including virtual participants;
- (b) Increase the number of in-person participants from each Party, particularly from developing country Parties;
- (c) Enhance a cooperative matchmaking function under the investment-focused events to assist Parties in accessing finance, including grants and concessional loans, including by:
  - (i) Inviting more multilateral development banks, financial institutions and the private sector to participate in the events;
  - (ii) Inviting the Climate Technology Centre, the Green Climate Fund and the Global Environment Facility to participate in the events in line with their mandates and resources;

(iii) Organizing the events in conjunction with other major investment events, while taking into account the need to ensure inclusive and balanced geographical representation of participants;

53. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 91,000 for 2026.

**18. Decision 15/CMA.7: Provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building**

54. The CMA, in paragraphs 9–10 of decision [15/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to develop and implement, in collaboration with the Consultative Group of Experts and other UNFCCC constituted bodies and relevant partners, as appropriate, the following initial list of activities and agreed to implement those referred to in paragraph 54(a–i) below on an annual basis in 2026–2028:

(a) Conducting a survey to gather information from Parties about the benefits and outcomes of and lessons learned from the implementation of activities mandated in decisions [18/CMA.5](#) and [21/CMA.6](#);

(b) Preparing a report on that survey for consideration at SBI 64 with a view to informing the activities referred to in paragraph 54(c–i) below so as to maximize their reach and effectiveness;

(c) Inviting Parties to submit views on experience and challenges related to implementing Article 13 of the Paris Agreement, including on preparing biennial transparency reports, establishing institutional arrangements, making projections of greenhouse gases, using data management tools and project management tools for preparing biennial transparency reports, stakeholder engagement, tracking support needed and received, navigating the modalities, procedures and guidelines for the transparency framework for action and support referred to in Article 13 of the Paris Agreement, including the flexibility provisions therein, and managing human resources;

(d) Preparing a synthesis report on those submissions, as well as on information reported in developing country Parties' biennial transparency reports, to be made available no later than three weeks prior to the first regular session of the SBI of the year;

(e) Organizing a workshop in world café format, to be held at the first regular session of the SBI of the year, for Parties to:

(i) Reflect on the report referred to in paragraph 54(b) above, the submissions referred to in paragraph 54(c) above and the synthesis report referred to in paragraph 54(d) above;

(ii) Engage in a structured dialogue with the Global Environment Facility and its implementing agencies, as appropriate;

(f) Preparing a summary report on the workshop referred to in paragraph 54(e) above, to be made available no later than three weeks prior to the second regular session of the SBI of the year;

(g) Organizing regional workshops, to be held in person and virtually, on experience, best practices, lessons learned and challenges related to implementing Article 13 of the Paris Agreement;

(h) Preparing summary reports on those regional workshops, to be made available no later than three weeks prior to the second regular session of the SBI of the year;

(i) Organizing a workshop in world café format, to be held at the second regular session of the SBI of the year, for considering the outcomes of all activities referred to in paragraph 54(c–h) above with a view to informing the next annual cycle of activities.

55. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 468,000 per year for 2026–2027. The budgetary impact in 2028 is expected to be similar to that in 2027.

**19. Decision 18/CMA.7: Belém Technology Implementation Programme**

56. The CMA, in paragraph 9 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), requested the TEC and the CTCN to incorporate, as appropriate, the elements of the Belém Technology Implementation Programme referred to in paragraph 8 of the same decision into their workplans and programmes of work respectively, as well as into the joint work programmes of the Technology Mechanism, which should also inform the monitoring and evaluation of their activities.

57. The CMA, in paragraph 10 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), requested the TEC and the CTCN to include information on actions taken to implement the Belém Technology Implementation Programme in their joint annual reports to the CMA.

58. The CMA, in paragraph 11 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), requested the TEC and the CTCN, with the support of the secretariat and interested partners, in consultation with the SBI Chair, and with the participation of a broad range of stakeholders, to convene a global in-session dialogue at the first session of the SBI each year, starting in 2027, to address challenges to implementing the technology priorities of developing countries at different stages of the technology cycle and challenges identified in the first periodic assessment of the Technology Mechanism, including through the exchange of information on enablers, good practices, challenges and lessons learned.

59. The CMA, in paragraph 14 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), requested the TEC to prepare, for inclusion in its annual reports to the CMA, a summary report on each global in-session dialogue.

60. The CMA, in paragraph 16 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), requested the CTCN, in collaboration with the TEC and with the support of interested partners, to convene regional dialogues in conjunction with its regional forums for national designated entities, starting in 2027.

61. The CMA, in paragraph 21 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), requested the TEC and the CTCN to identify opportunities for collaboration with multilateral development banks, climate financing institutions, and international organizations that facilitate climate technology development and transfer in exploring synergistic ways to secure funding and other support for implementing the Belém Technology Implementation Programme.

62. The CMA, in paragraph 23 of decision [18/CMA.7](#), encouraged the secretariat and the host of the Climate Technology Centre to enhance their resource mobilization efforts in order to meet the costs associated with implementing the mandated activities of the TEC and the CTCN and supporting the implementation of the Belém Technology Implementation Programme.

63. Pursuant to the decision, the secretariat will support the delivery of these mandates. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 223,000 for 2026 and EUR 520,000 for 2027.

**20. Decision 19/CMA.7: Implementation of the guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement**

64. The CMA, in paragraph 12 of decision [19/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to organize an informal interactive dialogue, to be held in conjunction with SB 65, to facilitate the identification of recurring themes and lessons learned for consideration by Parties of the compilation and synthesis of the results of the technical expert reviews under Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement in accordance with paragraph 13 of decision [2/CMA.3](#), including in the context of the review of the guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, referred to in paragraphs 14–15 of decision [2/CMA.3](#).

65. The CMA, in paragraphs 27–28 of decision [19/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to update the technical paper on options for funding the activities related to the infrastructure and technical expert reviews under Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement to serve as input to the consideration at SBI 64, with a view to recommending a draft decision on the matter for consideration and adoption at CMA 8, of the sufficiency and stability of funding for the:

- (a) Operation and maintenance of the infrastructure under Article 6, paragraph 2;
  - (b) Technical expert reviews under Article 6, paragraph 2;
  - (c) Capacity-building activities in respect of Article 6, paragraph 2.
66. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 32,000 for 2026.

**21. Decision 21/CMA.7: Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision 4/CMA.3**

67. The CMA, in paragraph 10 of decision [21/CMA.7](#), requested the secretariat to:

(a) Continue providing capacity-building support for identifying, developing and implementing NMAs, as well as for using the NMA Platform, to national focal points for Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement, prioritizing the provision of support to developing country Parties;

(b) Circulate, as appropriate, relevant resources on NMAs to national focal points for Article 6, paragraph 8, upon their designation;

(c) Conduct outreach for a broad range of stakeholders on the NMA Platform, including through relevant webinars, covering matters such as the functionality of the discussion forum, with the aim of increasing awareness of and engagement in the Platform;

(d) Improve the experience of users of the NMA Platform by:

(i) Adding new country filters such as “Small island developing States”;

(ii) Expanding the current drop-down menu under “Sectors” to encompass ecosystems, and including further breakdowns of sectors, ecosystems and other categories, to help users to filter for NMAs relevant to their interests;

(iii) Including an optional section for Parties submitting an NMA to indicate the type of approach pertaining to the NMA;

(iv) Ensuring that all countries are fully visible on the map and accurately reflecting the geographical locations (country and region) of NMAs.

68. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 175,000 for 2026.

## **B. Conclusions of the Conference of the Parties**

### **Agenda sub-item 2(f): Organization of work, including for the sessions of the subsidiary bodies**

69. COP 30, in the conclusions adopted under agenda sub-item 2(f),<sup>4</sup> requested the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies to convene a dialogue on mountains and climate change, supported by the secretariat, including on the need to hold an annual dialogue on mountains and climate change, in conjunction with SB 64, facilitated by two co-facilitators. The COP requested the co-facilitators, with the assistance of the secretariat and under the guidance of the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies, to prepare a summary report on the dialogue to be held at SB 64 and requested the Chairs to make an oral presentation on the summary report in their reports to COP 31.

70. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 38,000 for 2026.

### **Agenda item 4: Research and systematic observation**

71. SBSTA 63, in the conclusions adopted under agenda item 4,<sup>5</sup> requested the SBSTA Chair, with the assistance of the secretariat, to prepare an informal summary report on Earth Information Day 2025, held on 10 November 2025.

72. Estimated resource requirements amount to EUR 33,000.
