## Annex

### **Rationale provided by the Plurinational State of Bolivia, on behalf of the Like-minded Developing Countries, for including two items in the provisional agenda for the fifty-sixth session of the Subsidiary Body for Implementation**

On behalf of the LMDC, the Plurinational State of Bolivia is submitting this written proposal pursuant to Rule 12 of the Rules of Procedure of the COP/CMA as applied to their subsidiary bodies to add the following items to the provisional agenda of the fifty-sixth session of the Subsidiary Bodies to be held in Bonn, 6-16 June 2022.

#### **1. A joint agenda item for the SBSTA and SBI titled ‘Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation’.**

**Rationale:** At Glasgow, Parties decided “to establish and launch a comprehensive two-year Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation” (para 2 of decision 7/CMA.3 on Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation).”

It was further decided that the work programme will be carried out jointly by the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (para 4 of the decision) and “Invites the subsidiary bodies to carry out the work programme...” (para 5 of the decision).

We have noted that in the annotated provisional agendas for the 56<sup>th</sup> SBs issued by the Executive Secretary on 28 March 2022,<sup>[1]</sup> under agenda item 2(c)(i) under ‘Mandated events’ as ‘Events under the Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation’ is listed.

The mandated event should, however, be undertaken in the context of continued work by the SBs to ensure that the outcomes of the work programme of the global goal on adaptation (GGA) are duly reflected in appropriate recommendations from the SBs for the consideration of the CMA.

It must be recalled that para 7 of decision 7/CMA.3, sets out the objectives of the GGA work programme, while para 9 states that the activities of the work programme should build on the work of the Adaptation Committee, while drawing “on a variety of sources of information and inputs, including national adaptation plans and adaptation communications, take into account traditional knowledge, knowledge of indigenous peoples and local knowledge systems, and be gender-responsive”.

The decision via para 13 also invited Parties to provide submissions on their views on how to achieve the objectives under the work programme;

Para 15 of the decision requests the secretariat to prepare, under the guidance of the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies, a compilation and synthesis of those submissions for consideration at the workshops and para 16 also requests the secretariat to prepare, under the guidance of the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies, a single annual report on the workshops for consideration at the sessions of the SB, coinciding with the sessions of the CMA.

Further, para 17 “Invites the SBs to report annually to the CMA, taking into account the report referred to in paragraph 16 above, on progress in implementing the work programme with a view to recommending a draft decision thereon for consideration and adoption by the CMA its fifth session (November 2023). (Emphasis added).

Since the SBs have to report annually to the CMA, it is necessary for the agendas of the SBs to have a dedicated agenda item called “Matters relating to the Glasgow-Sharm-el-Sheikh work programme on the GGA”, beginning with the 56<sup>th</sup> session of the SBs.

This means that in addition to the agenda items under 2(c)(i) in relation to the GGA work programme as a mandated event, there must also be a separate agenda item on matters relating to the GGA work programme at the 56<sup>th</sup> session of SBs.

## **2. An agenda item for the SBI titled, ‘Matters relating to the Glasgow Dialogue on Loss and Damage’.**

**Rationale:** The CMA under paras. 73 and 74 of decision 1/CMA.3 established the Glasgow Dialogue to discuss the arrangements for the funding of activities to avert, minimize and address loss and damage associated with the adverse impacts of climate change, to take place in the first sessional period of each year of the Subsidiary Body for Implementation, concluding at its sixtieth session (June 2024) and requested the Subsidiary Body for Implementation to organize the Glasgow Dialogue in cooperation with the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts. These paragraphs were endorsed by the COP under para. 43, decision 1/CP.26.

In paragraph 2(d)(ii) of the annotated provisional agenda for SBI56 issued by the Executive Secretary on 28 March 2022,<sup>[2]</sup> the Glasgow Dialogue is listed as one of the mandated events that will take place during SBI56. The mandated event should, however, be undertaken in the context of continued work by the SBI on loss and damage finance-related issues to ensure that the outcomes of the Glasgow Dialogue are duly reflected in appropriate recommendations from the SBI for the consideration of the COP/CMA.

This means that in addition to paragraph 2(d)(ii) in relation to the Glasgow Dialogue as a mandated event, there must also be a separate agenda item on matters relating to the Glasgow Dialogue at SBI56. This will complement the existing agenda item 12 on matters relating to the Santiago Network that is reflected in the provisional agenda.

It is necessary to ensure that the discussions and progress of the Glasgow Dialogue is consistent and coherent with the progress made in strengthening the UNFCCC and its Paris Agreement’s institutional arrangements in relation to loss and damage and Parties’ actions in this regard. The work in relation to the Glasgow Dialogue cannot be treated separately from the work being undertaken through the WIM Executive Committee and its expert groups and task forces and the work relating to the Santiago Network on Loss and Damage.

This means that through the SBI and, ultimately the COP and CMA, Parties should exercise political oversight with respect to the progress and process of the Glasgow Dialogue, including through the development of recommendations by the SBI for draft decisions relating to the progress and process of the Glasgow Dialogue for the consideration of the COP and CMA at COP27/CMA4, COP28/CMA5, and COP29/CMA6, in relation to the establishment of the Loss and Damage Finance Facility.

Such an approach is consistent with the COP and CMA’s reiteration of the urgency of scaling up action and support, as appropriate, including finance, technology transfer and capacity-building, for implementing approaches for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change in developing country Parties that are particularly vulnerable to these effects; their acknowledgement of the importance of coherent action to respond to the scale of needs caused by the adverse impacts of climate change; and their resolve to strengthen partnerships between developing and developed countries, funds, technical agencies, civil society and communities to enhance understanding of how approaches to averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage can be improved (see paras. 61 and 71-72, decision 1/CMA.3, and paras. 39 and 44-45, decision 1/CP.26).
